- I am very pleased and can imagine how you feel (my family also left Famagusta in 74 and left everything behind). Mrs Lenia, apparently a neighbour of your father recognized him and sent me a message. I do not know if all are of your family. Do you have what's up? I can take photos of all and send them to you.

Yes I am on what's app if it's not too much trouble,. My number is 07737979172. Very much appreciated but you still haven't told me how you got hold of them because when we visited the house in Salamis road they said there was no photos in the house when they moved in!!!

Truly amazing I am the daughter of Photis Christoforou (the little girl in the white dress in one of the photos) and you have made us very happy returning these photos. A very humane gesture my only wish was that my mother God rest her soul was able to see these pictures. But it was never meant to be.

I cannot imagine how you felt when you decided to enter my house and pick up these photos with no plan whatsoever or of what use they would be to you. You actually kept the photos for 40 years (a lifetime if you ask me) and to eventually want to find the owners was unbelievable. And for this my father and I are indebted to you. I have so many questions such as when did you go to the house and what state was it in and was there any furniture left or was it all looted? I have since visited Famagusta when the borders were open and stopped outside my house. My husband went in and was welcomed by the current occupants but I was too frightened of my emotions so I stayed in the car!

I live in England and unfortunately was not present at the meeting in Paphos to reunite the photos with my father. I have read everything you have written and God bless you as you are an angel from heaven.

I hope one day to meet you but would like to keep in touch with you if you don't mind. I would love to hear about you and what you do and if you have ever visited Famagusta again.

Dear Tina

Thank you so much for your warm mail. I cannot say how happy I am. At first I want to say something more about me.

Now I am living alone in İstanbul winter times and at Akyaka in Muğla summer days. We have three children, one boy and two daughters. My son is Professor in Konya Seljuk University. We have lost younger daughter Özlem (1973-2011) because of cancer. She was very active in business life. The other Sibel is pharmacist and lives in İstanbul with her mother. I have three grandchildren. Now I am retired engineer working on history and water history. At the end of this March I will join "Cura

Aquarum in Athens” and I will present a poster on historical water supply. The participants are generally from Germany, Greece and Israel. I will be Athens from 28.03 to 06.04.2015 there.

My English teacher is myself, for this reason my English is not perfect.

Return back to 1975. We have a family friend of my wife Ülkü Hüseyin, a Turkish Cypriot from Nicosia. She is geography teacher and has got her education and diploma from Ankara University around 1957-1961.

We decided (I, my wife Düzay) wanted to visit them in Cyprus. We travelled by ship from Mersin to Famagusta and stayed two days there. My Dear Mehmet

Lovely to hear from you As you are interested Here is my life story.....

My mother and father were in the UK during the world war the 2. My mother was born in Nicosia and my father from Famagusta in fact St George's village very near to our house you visited.

My father was a restaurateur. We had many restaurants in London. My mother was a seamstress and made wedding dresses. In 1963 they decided enough was enough and they sold everything as they wanted to repatriate to Famagusta and so my father decided to draw and create a 3D plan of his dream house and with the help of an architect they perfected it and built it in Famagusta and we all moved there.

I was put in a school for English speaking children as I did not speak Greek. A few years later I went to the UK to study business studies and by 1968 my parents insisted I go back to Cyprus and they found me a job at the Evagoras Court Hotel very close to the house. I then went to work at the then Salamis Bay Hotel during its construction as it was owned by a British company called Hallmark Hotels - I think it's now called Salamis Conti!!!????

I met my husband in 1972 in Cyprus and we got married in 1973 and we left for an extended honeymoon in the UK.. We left all our wedding gifts and new furniture in the hope to return after a few months then 1974 happened the tragedy that uprooted my poor parents who left the house with nothing but the clothes on their back in the hope of return!! They went to the British bases as they were British and from there I don't remember how they travelled with their car to Greece and then came to the UK. We lost contact with them and had no idea where they were until they located us in the UK. They lived with us for many years and my mother sewed at home and my father worked in restaurants to earn a living. We lived in rented property and I was working to support us all until my husband Bambos could be allowed to stay in the UK as a British citizen because of me.

Sometime in the 80s the owner of the Evagoras Court Hotel which I had worked at and my father was the maitre' hotel there asked my dad to come back to Cyprus in

Paphos and help him open the run down Paphos Beach Hotel. So repatriating to Cyprus started again. Mum and dad came back and found a derelict house in Ktima which was abandoned by Turkish Cypriots. They settled there with no bathroom or kitchen and made it a home for them. My father worked at the Paphos Beach Hotel until he retired a few years ago.

We visited every year with my husband and my two daughters and eventually my father was able to build another beautiful house in Paphos with his hard earned savings.

My daughters were born in 1977 and 1980. Sally and Monica respectively Sally now has two daughters Alexia age 11 and Electra age 6. Monica has a little boy, Julio, who is 3.

We all visit Paphos and stay in my dad's big house every summer. Bambos and I a little more often as we do not work anymore Dad is now 92 so we like to visit regularly. He is all I have left as I have no brothers and sisters!

So this brings us up to date!

Photos from a not-so-distant past

CHRISTINA VOSCOU

I recently stumbled upon a few quaint, black-and-white photos found in Famagusta making the rounds on social media. Belonging to a not-so-distant past, most are family portraits; some are from social gatherings and others from holidays.

Unfortunately, these are faces I don't recognize but, in the hope that they find their rightful owner, I, like many others, clicked and shared them.

Still, as soon as I did that, a hint of pessimism caught up with me. Cyprus being as small as it is, you would think there is a good chance of finding someone who knows something about at least one person in the photos. But, these photographs are different.

Since I was a child, I have had a very intimate relationship with photographs. I was fascinated taking them, being in them and capturing seemingly trivial moments whenever I could. I enjoyed flipping through our family's or friends' albums and talking about each memory brought on by what we were looking at.

I was particularly captivated by older photographs, particularly the ones with faces I didn't recognize. If one happened to catch my eye, I could build an entire story out of it – of what those people were doing before and after that shot.

Elaborate scenarios would spring from just the look in someone's eyes, the background in the picture, or the possible date it was taken.

So many stories

One can only imagine that these particular photos have so many stories within them, primarily because they were taken years ago and they were lost because of a war. And the unfortunate reality is that, because so many years have passed, many of those individuals may have passed away. It would be wonderful if at least their relatives could find and treasure them.

But looking at these forgotten photos of complete strangers, I have found myself unable to form an intricate story of what they could have been doing on that particular day. They have paused my imagination. Perhaps, this is because a part of me acknowledges that they could be lost forever, never seen again by their subjects or their families.

Perhaps it is in knowing that what followed for most of these families was the cruelty of war.

But even though I can only see them on a computer screen, they've transported me back in time, back to those peaceful days. Those days before any of the major troubles and before I was even born.

At a time when the two main communities of the island lived together in a mostly convivial atmosphere and it was okay.

Even though I have not lived through this war or any other, I have seen what it does to people. In the worst cases, it leaves them with a never-ending hatred and in the best of cases with a poisonous rancour that almost erases any happy memories.

I have seen people unable to look through their pre-war photo albums. It almost feels like there is a weight dragging them down, unable to smile while holding a small rectangular glossy paper from the past. Will it ever go away?

Their souls seem unable to ever find the peace they are looking for, and just like them, these photos have lost their ability to tell a story or the real story. Those previously blissful memories have become embossed with this bitterness.

It saddens me to realize this, but a big part of me feels that we will never move forward unless we start telling the stories behind these pictures. Behind the many pictures that prove life before the troubles wasn't all full of hatred.

Instead, in most cases, when we try to talk about the issue, we focus on the brutality, the cruelty, the disappearances and the death, conveniently forgetting about the, all-too-ordinary, human stories that surrounded these events.

Photographs like these should become one of the many excuses the two communities can use to finally come closer, despite the division.

Otherwise, even if they are found by their owners, somehow they are still forever lost.

Post Script

After writing this story, I went looking for these photographs online and discovered that they were indeed returned to their rightful owner. I am hoping for more similar happy endings.

The photographs in question were found in January 1975 by Mehmet Bildirici in an abandoned house. He kept them for 40 years, unable to contact someone about them.

In 2014, he met Shenorik Altun and mentioned the photographs to her. With the help of the Armenian representative in Parliament, Vartkes Mahdessian, the family was found.

They belong to Photis Charalambous, whose family settled in Paphos after 1974. They were returned to him in January this year, by Maggy Mahdessian (wife of Vartkes) with Lena Bahadourian (sister in-law of Shenorik Altun).
